2022 Meeting Summary

For the first time in two years, the Academy had the opportunity of meeting in beautiful San Diego this past June at

the Coronado Bay Resort on Coronado Island. Due to previous meeting cancellations, Memoria were attributed to Dr. Charles Ellinger, Dr. Gordon King, Dr. William Laney, Dr. Davis Garlapo, Dr. George Murrell, Dr. Niles Guichet, Dr. Thomas Vergo and Mr. Masahiro Kuwata.

Sponsorship of the meeting came from 15 generous vendors that sponsored based on clinical and technological offerings in addition to sponsorship of the prosthodontic graduate student poster session. Attendance was moderate (21 fellows absent) but the discussion from presentations, poster session, and fellowship was at a spirited high. The meeting was a success from objectives of its scientific merit, reunion of fellowship, as its financial outcome is still being finalized.

Membership report

Prior to the meeting, membership includes 146 Fellows that consists of 18 Associate Fellows, 73 Active Fellows, 49 Life Fellows and 6 Honorary Fellows. This is a decline from previous year of 153 with the difference being 2 resignations and the balance of deceased Life Fellows.

After the business meeting concluded, 7 new Life Fellows, 8 Active Fellows, 1 Associate, 3 Honorary Fellows were confirmed totaling 165 Fellows.

AP Financial Summary

Discussion of The Academy's financial sustainability is taken very seriously with realization in reduction of sponsorship, guest registration, and increases of meeting and administrative costs. Projected financial resources may fall below a critical threshold that would

cover meeting and administrative costs posing a risk to the Academy's financial stability.

After this fiduciary look at the state of the Academy, discussion from the Executive Council was prompted and it was agreed upon by the fellowship to increase the dues by \$300 over the next three years (\$150 first year, \$100 second year and \$50 third year). **Therefore, 2023 dues will be \$535 plus \$500 social event fees (\$1,035).**

With the mission of the Academy being: *Study, Investigate, Promote, and Disseminate*, it is hopeful that we continue to attract the very best and continue to make an indelible impression within our specialty and communities.

The 2024 Annual Meeting Location

With discussion from the Executive Council and previously scheduled 2021 meeting, the 2024 annual meeting is scheduled for the Four Seasons Hotel in Denver, Colorado May 29- June 1, 2024. 2023 Academy of Prosthodontics Annual Program in Naples, Florida

Dear Academy Fellows,
President John Sorensen and I are very excited to present the 2023 program and looking forward to a great discussion in

Naples, Florida. The world of dental technologies is rapidly evolving. The pursuit of efficient and high-quality dental care combining innovative treatment planning tools and computer-aided manufacturing technology, has drastically changed our practice. With the rapid progress of digital dentistry, many clinical and in-vitro studies have been examined and published in recent years. So, we put our best efforts into bringing the world's experts in innovative digital surgical and restorative treatment approaches to the upcoming annual meeting. The program will review the current status of digital workflow utilization and advancement in dental materials for digital dentistry.

Day One - Advancements in Digital Technology in the World of Surgery.

On the first day, we will dive into the current advancements in digital surgical planning, robotic surgery, and virtually assisted surgery in executing simple or complex treatments. Dr. Robert Hannan, Chief of Cardiovascular Surgery at Nicklaus Children's Hospital and the Senior Medical Director at the Advanced Projects Laboratory, will share how 3D-printing and virtual technologies helped to plan and to perform one of the most challenging surgeries. Additionally, an oral surgeon father and a prosthodontist son team, Dr. Edmond and Armand Bedrossian, will talk about the prosthetic and surgical factors in selecting the optimal combination of the digital and analog workflows in the management of severely atrophic maxillae with zygomatic implants. Also, Dr. Thomas Wiedemann from NYU Dentistry, who is at the forefront of implementing robotic-assisted implant placement in an educational setting, will discuss the workflow and new robotic-assisted surgical educational models.

Day Two and Three - Innovations in Dental

Materials and Dental Laboratories

The advanced fabrication processes and digital dental materials in CAD/CAM technologies left us with many questions about clinical performance. However, more clinicians are leaning toward digital clinical procedures and laboratory technique workflows that have not been sufficiently investigated. During these days, expert material scientists and dental technologists will discuss the current state of the art in dental materials and fabrication techniques. Among the important topics, our Academy Fellow, Steve Sadowsky, and his co-inventor, Jeff Stansbury, will discuss the new printed denture tooth and base printer polymer, Trusana™.

Day Four

Dr. Rebecca Moazzez, the Chair of the Department of Preventive and Restorative Dentistry at the University of the Pacific, is a global expert in dental erosion and erosive tooth wear and will reveal the “truth” about wear. Dr. Elena Hernandez-Kucey will talk about neuromodulation therapy in prosthodontic practice.

Also, Dr. Irena Sailer, Dr. Aristotelis Marinis, and Dr. Hans-Peter Weber will discuss the material selection, digital workflow, and surgical aspects of implant-supported prostheses.

In planning for the 2023 Academy of Prosthodontics Meeting, President John Sorensen, who had been the Program Chair for two years in a row for the Academy, has been a tremendous help, and we worked seamlessly together. I want to extend a special thanks to President Sorensen and the Executive Council for their tireless work and unseen support behind the scenes. One on One with Dr. Steve Eckert, Past President of the Academy of Prosthodontics

This is a descriptive biography that is authored by Steven Eckert, Past President of The Academy of Prosthodontics.

I was born in 1954, the son of a first-generation mother and a young man from the Bronx. At a young age, we moved to Cleveland. I remember my father always talking about working on the day that Don Larsen pitched the first and only perfect game in World Series history. Dad always said that he could've gotten tickets to that game, but he needed to be home at the end of the day. I don't remember any of it because I was born in 1954 and Larsen had his perfect game in 1956, I was 2 1/2 so the only thing that I can truly say is that I remember my father reminiscing about that game. But Cleveland was nice, I could be a Yankees fan, and no one would really be upset because the Indians were, let's say it delicately, underachievers.

Actually, the New York Yankees, and specifically Mickey Mantle taught me a lot about life. My dad took me to an Indians game, of course against the Yankees, and the Mick was out there hammering balls over the fence in batting practice. He stopped to stretch and pointed up at the stands in the area where we were seated. He called the ball boy over, he signed a baseball and then he pointed the ball boy up to the area where we were. I turned to my dad and said, "Mick is going to give us a signed baseball!" The ball boy came up the stands, turned left when he should've turned right, and handled the ball to a, even as I recollect it now, rather buxom blonde-haired woman. At that young age I learned that life has its twists and turns.

I ascended to dentistry by suggestions of a guidance counselor and friend of my older sister Louraine. I entered Ohio State School of Dentistry and after finishing went to a GPR in Chicago where I thought I would stay. I realized that in teaching fixed prosthodontics at Loyola, that if I wanted to teach, I'd have to specialize. I applied to Mayo Clinic and gained a new family where Ron Desjardins was my program director. The experience was incredible and catapulted my career ultimately becoming program director myself there.

I met the love of my life, Susan, through an odd set of circumstances by relatives introducing us.

The first AP meeting I attended was in the Bahamas with Susan and I have missed very few meetings since.

If you could add to the above, it would allow some dialogue by the following questions:

1. Can you cite some examples of those who you felt were influential over your career in prosthodontics?

Teaching at Mayo, it was easy with new mentors outside of dental school Bill Laney, Ron Desjardins, and Ned Van Roekel. Ron asked me to attend the meeting in the Bahamas. It was amazing so that I had gone to the AAFP in a few years in a row, it seemed like if you were going to get involved in an organization you had to hop in headfirst. The AP was definitely all in. The meeting was great, but it was nothing we hadn't heard in residency. So I know

I was in the right residency. I was asked to stay on and Ron was the first to stay on after his residency. Ned was the first to come from outside. I was the first after Ron. The first house that Susan and I bought, was from Bill and Sally Laney in Rochester. It was their first house as well. It was a great opportunity as I could see right away that this was a place where I could spend a career where I could turn to someone when needed and I could help others in a practice and career.

2. As Prosthodontics increases in automated and digital technology, can you give some prediction of the future of the specialty?

It is interesting because a lot of the technical advances have been made easier to be a reasonably successful clinician, because so much of the work is and will become more automated in the future. This will help make up for mistakes that people make. We graduated in a class of 202 graduates at Ohio State. At least 101 graduated at the bottom of their class, it's hard for people that graduated at that point to treat patients and do it well. It's also best to be better with the emotional aspect of communicating with patients.

I watched a student at Loyola give an injection that was a bit harsh and I took the student aside to give the injection in a less painful way. I learned if I can control the patient they will respect me a lot more.

- 3. Your legacy as a president of this organization, others, Board Examiner, program director, editor is noteworthy. For women that want to follow a leadership path, do you feel it is achievable in these times?**

It is ,...when you arrive in that position, there is the realization that this is important to the profession, your patients and yourself. Everyone will be treated well with great respect. The other givers of the staff, and the other residents, we were lucky to be received in a positive way. We're going to see more of a gender neutrality. The AP will lead others in this direction. I really think that's great! One of my best friends in the Academy got in before me, but she never thought of herself as a woman plowing the new

field. She was just seeking the answers to her questions. We became close because we shared the same philosophy. The AP is very neutral to gender of incoming AP fellows where everyone is treated the same. When you're in a group like that you're going to give as much as you can. Rhonda Jacob, HP Weber and I were in the same class. I left,...2 others were in it for a period of time. For HP, Rhonda and myself it was a great match as all of us became president.

- 4. Education in prosthodontics has changed a bit with delivery methods, social media influence, and digital arena. What elements of prosthodontic education do you feel will remain as an important part of the learning process?**

As we go along, we'll see a better appreciation of how we'll treat the patient in way that is appropriate for them. This is going to be more important if it's not already there. We are looking at students with less of years in training. This becomes a tougher task,...you'll see more of the tougher bolder to push up that hill. Not getting the benefits of the artistic expression in dental education.

5. **As an editor of a major international prosthodontic journal, you're seeing specific areas on research and clinical science. Can you indicate areas where this focus should be expanded as there is limited evidence / documentation?**

We do an awful lot with limited documentation and limited evidence. We do treatment using mechanical means where our thought is if we follow these mechanical means, it will be alright. It happens in lots of areas in dentistry. We receive training in MFP, "the bulletproof prosthodontist",...which is a great analogy.

This creates an environment that allows you to be artistic. Mechanistic to artistic transition to make, ..the blend that will always be there. Will see changes in the way it's taught and executed. We will see robotics and completely systematic from A to Z, but in doing that you lose some of the artistry. Television personalities are star of the show with glowing white

teeth, where it's troubling to see someone mistake white for beauty. It's something that we're seeing more all of the time.

At the end of the meeting, I thanked Dr Eckert for his input. I also appreciated his time spent with me during our four years of overlap here at Mayo Clinic. I remarked to him that I learned many things in being over his shoulder while he was teaching residents, giving lectures, and discussing research methodology. It was pretty clear that my intent was basically to acknowledge his time spent here as an educator, clinician, and researcher. At the end of this interview, he was thanking me for what I had given to him as a participant in Academy proceedings and other venues. Frankly, I was humbled by his approach and at the end, recognize the commonality that the Academy promotes between its members which is mainly being humility and mutual respect.

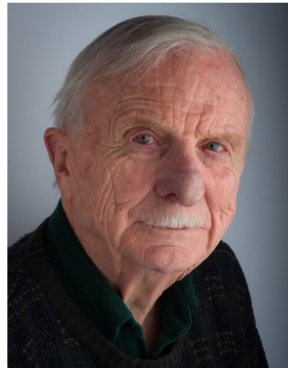
Academy of Prosthodontics Fellow Carlo Ercoli Elected to Education and Research Division Director of the American College of Prosthodontists, August 18, 2022

based critical analysis of each application of digital technology / software for each step in prosthodontics / surgery and detailed examination of digital materials by materials scientists. We want our meeting to be more than just show-and-tell with pretty cases. Drawing on the tremendous talent and expertise of our Academy clinicians, they will share their research and experience comparing digital- and analogue-workflows in their practice.

Beyond our critical analysis of the prosthodontic digital workflow, Dr. Choi's program covers a wide range of topics that is sure to have something for everyone. From dental erosion to cleft lip prosthodontic treatment, to adjunctive neuromodulator therapy, to treatment of advanced atrophic ridge situations.

Academy Finances:

Having faced the increased challenges of securing sufficient annual corporate sponsorship, which is so critical to supporting our annual sessions, the

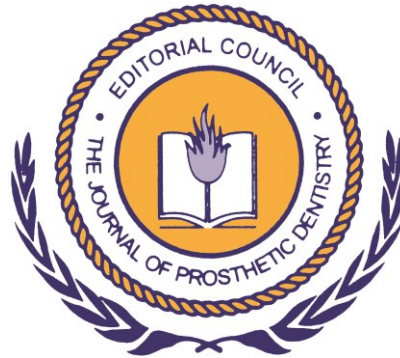
