2024 Meeting Summary

The Academy met in Denver, Colorado this past May 29-June 1st at the Four Seasons hotel. This year's annual meeting brought

together an exceptional gathering, fostering scientific exchange, fellowship, and camaraderie. The event featured a remarkable lineup of presenters from North America and Europe. While attendance was somewhat limited, the meeting was widely regarded as a success, thanks to the high-quality program and the vibrant energy throughout the four-day event. Moving forward, new policies will be introduced to boost participation.

Membership report

Prior to the 2024 AP meeting, membership consistent of 144 Fellows including 11 Associate Fellows, 73 Active Fellows, 52 Life Fellows and 8 Honorary Fellows. This is a slight decline from the previous year

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of 146 with the difference being attributed to 2 resignations and the balance of deceased Life Fellows. After the business meeting concluded, 3 new Life Fellows, 4 Active Fellows, 3 Associate Fellows were confirmed totaling 147 Fellows.

At the conclusion of the 2024 meeting, the AP membership includes: 147 Fellows with 75 Active Fellows, 10 Associate Fellows, 54 Life Fellows, and 8 Honorary Fellows.

There is a financial shortfall in the budget report, which includes costs related to the low meeting

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registration and low sponsorships. It was suggested that efforts should be made to avoid scheduling AP meetings in the beginning of May which might overlap with the ITI World Symposium meeting.

The Academy is navigating challenges related to sustaining meeting expenses, including event planning and scientific venues. While the foundation provides some financial support, the Academy is actively developing strategic plans to ensure long-term stability and success:

- 1. Fellowship dues increased to \$1,335.00 for the coming year (\$537 assessment, \$98 JPD subscription, \$500 for annual meeting social events fees and \$200 Meeting Registration)
- 2. The EC is authorized to apply annual inflationary adjustments to current assessments and meeting registration.
- 3. Life Fellows be assessed a \$200 Meeting registration fee due at the time of registration and not part of annual dues.

Please tell us a little
about yourself and your
family.

I live in Brisbane, Australia with my husband Terry Walton and our daughter Georgina. Life is busy as we juggle our private practices, research, and academic teaching, all while keeping up with the activities and adventures of our lively eight-year-old daughter. Beyond work, both Terry and I are actively involved in volunteer works for our profession, and our community – it is rewarding, but also contributes to the modern complexity of lack of time.

Why did you become a Prosthodontist?

It is interesting to trace people's journey through education and beyond. As a child, I enjoyed working with my hands - needlework, sewing, calligraphy, quilling (a medieval paper twirling art). I have always enjoyed caring for others – it was a strong philosophy of my family and was well supported by my education. Interestingly, I have also always loved solving puzzles - mathematics puzzles, but other puzzles too. Dentistry certainly leaned towards caring for people. prosthodontics allowed me to use my hands to make, and my brain to think - and to solve those puzzles. I did not really think it would also lead to mathematical puzzles, but indeed it did, through my studies in biostatistics. Ultimately, my career has turned into a fulfilling journey that I love—one that unfolded in ways I never anticipated

What have been pivotal or important influences in your career?

I have been fortunate to have mentors and colleagues who have significantly influenced and supported my career, but the most pivotal influences have undoubtedly come from my family. Growing up with parents who were schoolteachers, I absorbed the

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importance of education through osmosis. They supported my early career choices financially, and my mother continues to do so in so many other ways - many of you would know her as a regular attendee at the Academy meetings.

My husband and I collaborate a lot in research, which not only enriches our professional lives but also offers a welcome escape from the complexities of running our prosthodontic practice. I take great pride in the research we have published together; it is gratifying to hear it cited and to know that our work may positively impact patient care.

The arrival of our daughter 8 years ago brought a wonderful burst of energy and joy, teaching me the true value of time management. Being her mother is the most important role I will ever have, and the one that has had the most influence on my career. I feel truly privileged to balance my responsibilities as a prosthodontist and researcher alongside this essential role in my life.

How did you get involved in the Academy of Prosthodontics?

I attended the Young Prosthodontists Educators Workshop organized by Dr George Zarb in 2006, and it was then when I meet so many incredible prosthodontists. You are the Editor and Chair of the 10th edition of the Glossary of Prosthodontic Terms. Can you describe what the GPT is, its relation to the AP, and why is it important to the field of prosthodontics?

The Glossary of Prosthodontic Terms is a living repository of our prosthodontic language. It was first published in 1956 under the editorship of Carl Boucher and the Nomenclature Committee of the Academy of Denture Prosthetics, which was to become the Academy of Prosthodontics. It has since been through ten iterations. Those works have been undertaken by editors and committees

appointed by the Academy, and with each successive edition including additional terms and updating definitions to reflect understanding and use. The Glossary helps prosthodontics understand its language, so that the most appropriate term can be used where applicable; and it also reflects that language, enabling its growth without being constrained by falsely immutable benchmarks. I suppose it both decodes and encodes the language, belonging to no one person or organization, but it and our profession owes a debt of gratitude to the stewardship of The Academy for its vast utility and ongoing trajectory.

What was the process for updating the GPT like?

Deliberate, considered, frustrating at times - but always interesting, and it always led to unexpected interactions as viewpoints and perspectives were explored. The identification of missing terms often opened a "Pandoras box", where the speed of research and development unintentionally resulted in the creation and modification of terms that then required quite swift attention by the GPT. In this role it was important to accept that a Glossary reflects a language,

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it does not contain it and should not seek to do so. But, as part of that understanding, it was then difficult when the GPT identified included terms that had become obsolete, potential terms that were not yet stable enough in their use for inclusion, or frequently used terms that really were in the category of "slang" – it is arguable that the simpler task for the GPT was when terms required inclusion, rather than exclusion.

Did you learn something new or surprising while updating the GPT?

The learnings were not surprising, but they were important, nonetheless. We talk about entities such as the GPT as being living lists, living repositories – but interacting with a document in real time as the world moves on around it is quite an interesting phenomenon. At the eleventh hour we were still modifying final terms, adding information that we were keen to see make the "cut" for the GPT 2023. The GPT will never be complete – but I think that its infinity horizon also adds to its presence – it almost

demands to be nurtured and updated – keen and able to grow. In many ways, it is an example to us all.

Why did you pursue a career that blends both academia and private practice? Can you describe how you balance and blend those realms of dentistry?

I think you need all things to live a balanced and fulfilling life. In my opinion, in private practice, with time, one could become blinkered by (and potentially drowned by) the business of prosthodontics. Equally, in academia, it is my opinion that with time one could become blinkered by the ivory towers, and risk overlooking the realities of patient care. Neither career path is for the faint hearted. We all see so many around us who have burnt out -early - taking their knowledge and enthusiasm with them. For me, blending the two keeps my grounded, and hopefully becomes my secret to a long and fulfilling career contributing to both fields - my patients for whom I personally care; and my patients, again, by way of academic pursuits that aim to benefit the many.



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Lastly, where do you see the future of dentistry with the advancement of technology, especially with artificial intelligence software that are emerging?

As always, I foresee that the pendulum will swing, initially, too far: With treatment planning algorithms tempting clinicians to forget (or choose) not to think; With bots automating charting in space but overlooking the three dimensional complexity of transfer of loads between teeth; With software smart notes pertaining to record the content of a consultation, but not understanding the nuances of human fears and worries. I have seen each of these things so far – and the pendulum has so much further to swing. AI is a formidable tool, but its foundations are designed by humans, and humans are fallible - we must never lose sight of that potential fallibility. I look forward to the damped oscillation that will occur, influenced by the gravity of time and the benefit of hindsight - but, that's the mathematician coming out in me!

Since 1997, Dr. Thomas Taylor, professor and chair of prosthodontics, and Dr. John Agar, professor of prosthodontics—along with rising third year prosthodontics residents—have traveled to Sitka, AK nearly every June to deliver new smiles to a population that otherwise might never receive proper dental care. To date, over 800 dentures have been made. Over four decades ago, the Academy of Prosthodontics started a program in different parts of the country to deliver dentures to underserved populations. In 1993, the program landed in Juneau, Alaska with a general dentist from Oregon and member of the Southeast Alaska Regional Health Consortium (SEARHC), Dr. Thomas Jordan, at the helm. In 1997, Taylor joined Jordan, and in 2003 the clinic moved from Juneau to Sitka. Jordan is retiring this year after 31 years of running the program, meaning that this summer was most likely the last for the program that has helped

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transform the smiles of hundreds of Native Americans. There is no appointed successor, and no one locally is willing to take on the massive responsibility. "Participating in this volunteer outreach program was a transformative experience for both the resident doctors and the patients. For the patients, many of whom had limited access to dental care, receiving custom dentures was a lifechanging event, significantly improving their quality of life and self-esteem. For the resident doctors, the program provided a rare opportunity to apply their specialized skills in a real-world setting, fostering professional growth and a deeper appreciation for community service." When asked if there are any plans to ever return to Sitka, especially after spending a week every summer for nearly three decades working tirelessly to deliver an average of 30 dentures per trip, Taylor and Agar looked at each other and smiled. "Yes, we're planning a fishing trip," Taylor remarked. The Academy's Mission is to Study, Investigate, Promote and Disseminate. 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
