Day one: On Wednesday, when Drs. We will then enjoy, for our first night in Denver, the Welcome Reception and Blatterfein Dinner with our friends. Please remember that while we are all looking forward to meeting fellows and friends, the Academy spirit is one of Fellowship and inclusion! Feel free to include guests and new friends with your dinner plans who may be unfamiliar yet (and certainly not for long!) with the Academy camaraderie and warm welcoming atmosphere.

Day two: On Thursday, we will kick off the session with a current and challenging thematic discussion, "The management of the high smile line patient". We have arranged for a distinguished and multidisciplinary speaker panel with Drs. Mario Imburgia, Dimitri Tatakis, Dimitri Papadimitriou and Christos Krasadakis who will discuss their approach to the treatment of these challenging patients. Digital techniques, tools and applications for multidisciplinary treatment planning will guide a comprehensive approach to patient management including esthetic crown lengthening, surgical lip repositioning, orthognathic surgery and facial

injectables. A round table will follow to allow for a vibrant discussion, as it is in the best tradition of the Academy, so get your questions ready! After the coffee break and the opportunity to interact with our corporate partners, we will resume the presentations with Drs. Will Martin, Lambis Petridis, and Caroline Nguyen who will describe new approaches to esthetic risk assessment in prosthodontics, myths and realities of implantabutment connections as well as how surgical optimized outcomes can be with sound prosthodontic approaches. Dr. Dima Ghunaim will then close the session with a talk about the most precious of our patients, the pediatric patient in need of complex implant reconstructions.

Day three: On Friday morning, the scientific program will start with a thoughtful discussion on the effect that complete edentulism has on our patients, practices and societies, as well as outlining what are the latest digital workflows for complete denture fabrication that may allow prosthodontics to more effectively treat this often-underserved segment of the population. Drs. Frauke Muller and

Lucio LoRusso will outline, from the patient's and clinician's perspectives, what potentials digital dentistry may usher for the treatment of complete edentulism while Dr. Sree Koka will lead the discussion on how complete edentulism affects the morbidity, mortality and health economics of our patients and societies. The session will continue with Drs. Irena Sailer and Joseph Kan, who will provide their sound, long-term experience with zirconia restorations and immediate anterior implant placement. Drs. Panos Papaspyridakos and Ronald Jung will bring the session home with a provocative look at how disruptive digital technologies allow for the development of innovative, personalized patient solutions. The Academy business meeting will take place in the afternoon where we will have a chance to discuss the matters facing the Fellowship. In the evening, we will celebrate and have fun during the black-tie, President's reception and installation banquet.





One on One with Dr. Gerald (Jerry) Barrack.

A Journey Through Excellence By Mijin Choi President-elect, Academy of Prosthodontics



In an interview, Dr. Gerald (Jerry) Barrack, a prosthodontist with over five decades of experience, shared insights into his professional journey and his contributions to the field of prosthodontics. Dr.

Barrack's story is not just a story of personal achievement but a testament to the pioneering spirit that has driven advancements in dental practices and education.

Career Highlights that Defined a Legacy

Dr. Barrack's career highlights include his gnathology courses, which he attended in 1964-66 and were led by Dr. Frank Celenza. These courses were a turning point in his career, setting the stage for a future marked by innovation and dedication. He went on to enroll in NYU's postgraduate prosthodontics program in 1971, laying the foundation for a remarkable journey in prosthodontics. One of Dr. Barrack's significant achievements is his involvement in developing the etched cast restoration technique, which was initially met with skepticism by many in the field. However, through an 11-year clinical study and collaboration with pioneers like Richard Simonson and Van Thompson, this method proved highly successful, boasting a long-term success rate of up to 93%. He is also very proud of the fact that he was a co-founder of the Academy of Osseointegration.

Mentorship and Inspiration

Dr. Barrack attributes much of his success to the mentorship and support of figures like Louis Blatterfein and Ira Klein and his first mentor in the Academy, Hart Long, who exemplified an inspirational character and inclusive attitude. Bill Laney and Frank Celenza, in particular, played pivotal roles in Dr. Barrack's career, with Frank Celenza being a lifelong friend and mentor.

Innovations and Contributions

The interview also shed light on Dr. Barrack's legendary work with resin-bonded fixed partial dentures (FPD), a venture he described as risky yet rewarding. His deliberate approach in applying fundamental principles of retention and resistance forms in utilizing the resin-bonded FDP provided more treatment options for patients.

When asked about the most significant advances in dentistry over his career, Dr. Barrack pointed to the introduction of fluoride, high-speed dental handpiece drills, adhesive dentistry (which all occurred from 1955-1959 while he was in dental school at the Univ of PA), dental implants, and CAD/CAM technology as revolutionary changes that have reshaped dental practices and patient care.


Vision for the Future

Reflecting on the evolution of prosthodontics, Dr. Barrack noted the significant increase in female practitioners and leaders in the field, marking a transformative shift towards gender equality within dentistry. He praised the contributions of pioneers like Juliet Bergen, Jane Brewer, and Diane Rekow, who have paved the way for women in prosthodontics.

Dr. Barrack expressed a deep appreciation for the AP, highlighting the quality of its academic discussions, the friendliness of its members, and the organization's role in leading the forefront of Prosthodontic advancements. His experiences with the AP, among other organizations, have left him with enduring memories and a firm belief in the value of its contributions to the field.

Looking Forward

Dr. Barrack remains optimistic about the future of the AP and prosthodontics. His story inspires and motivates current and future generations of prosthodontists, exemplifying the profound impact of lifelong learning, the importance of mentorship, and the relentless pursuit of excellence.
